Keep up the pressure to Stop SERCO!

As we said in the last issue, the Trust is considering outsourcing the procurement department to Serco. Outsourcing to private companies is always bad, but Serco in particular has recently shown itself to be unable to handle public sector contracts - charging the government for tagging prisoners who were dead, having to pull out of the out of hours contract in Cornwall because in incompetence. There are lots of very good reasons for not giving out contracts to this company right now.

The Trust is concerned about it's reputation. As it stands the campaign to save our hospital, has done nothing but improve the Trust's reputation. We're a bigger bolder organisation now, which has doubled in size since the merger. Clinically the worst of the statistics are not showing any cause for concern, and financially, apparently, in the ways that it matters to them, the Trust is doing all right.

It'd be a real shame, from their point of view, wouldn't it to have the community demonstrating with loud brash, media attracting placards outside its board meetings? This is what we must deliver unless they back down now in their plans to outsource the procurement department to Serco. Fortunately the unions were united in their determination not to let management spoil the day, and management had to make a last minute humiliating u-turn, sending out an e-mail on Chrsitmas Eve to say all taxis would be paid for in full.

Nurses to become immigration cops

After screaming hysteria over Bulgarian and Romanian immigration, the government has announced plans to charge foreign nationals for treatment in A&E. Lord Howe suggested that he would be installing chip and pin machines in A&E departments. The BMA has argued that the system will cost more to administer than it will take in revenue with staff caught up in paperwork as they act as immigration cops. The government claim that the cost of treating foreign nationals on the NHS is £500 million a year. But others have shown the real figure is closer to £30-50 million (fullfact.org). In any case, the answer to this problem is to argue aggressively for universal healthcare across the rest of the world. If other countries had decent public healthcare then this problem would not exist. Instead, the government is attempting to break up the NHS and introduce the worst elements of private healthcare to Britain. We would be naïve to think they haven't got a few more uses for those chip-and-pin machines up their sleeves.

In the past, when the government tried to turn social workers into immigration cops, Unison took a


strong stand against it, supporting any social workers who refused to comply. We need a similar campaign now. We must stand together with our brothers and sisters across the world against the international capitalist class.
