We need to organise as wide a range as possible of volunteers to run street stalls, petitioning, public meetings, door-to-door campaigning, as is being done in other boroughs in London.

Moving the heavyweight structures of the unions is essential. It can't be done without also mobilising in all the local day-to-day struggles against cuts, which across the country have saved services like libraries or old people's services, sometimes without any union action at all.
