
In a note to the previous NC I apologised for the lack of minutes, explaining that I had been submerged in the finances. I hoped affairs would soon improve. I was wrong. At this NC again I am presenting comrades with a great mass of minutes, mostly late.

I would not ask comrades to consider this situation anything but intolerable. The same, but more so, goes for the deficiencies in circulars, the unreliable and tardy response to correspondence, and the poor distribution of the IB.

Branch circulars have provided a bare minimum of information. For these minutes, I have not typed up routine items of no durable interest, or the discussions - which have taken much of the time of the OC and EC - on the TILC meeting, the Tebbit campaign, and the April 3 conference, which are dealt with elsewhere.

A brief word of explanation, if not excuse. On one level, the explanation is that in the old I-CL I was responsible for minutes, circulars, correspondence, IB etc as well as working on a 12 page fortnightly paper. Now I am responsible for that same admin work for an organisation twice the size, plus a 16 page weekly paper, plus finance, plus a bigger load of internal meetings.

More fundamentally, we have a problem of growth - of constructing a central apparatus suitable to an organisation our size rather than to a small, informal group.

The OC has agreed to schedule a discussion on this more fundamental problem. In the meantime, I have taken steps to enlist help from other comrades to relieve the bad situation on administration.

1. NC preparations. Procedure agreed. A resolution from Cunliffe was presented on women in the WSL - it was agreed to discuss it at the next EC, with comrades from the women's steering committee invited, and to ask Parkinson to organise consultation with the leading women comrades before then.

2. Summer school. Outline plans agreed as per separate sheet.

OC. 22.4.82

Present: Smith, Levy, Hill, Kinnell, Carolan, Jones. Absent: Cunliffe (local commitment).

+ NHS pay: Meeting of NHS cds to be organised Sunday 24th. Cunliffe to be responsible from OC.

+ Broad groups conference: Preliminary discussion. Agreed to discuss use of this conference further at next OC, but certainly to go for a broad range of speakers and observers.

+ Oxford resignations and repercussions in women's commission. Long discussion. Agreed to oppose a closed session of NC on this, as apparently proposed by East Midlands area committee; Smith to report from OC to full extended NC, approaching issue from standpoint of defence of party.

OC. 18.4.82

Present: Smith, Hill, Kinnell, Levy. Absent: Jones, Carolan, Cunliffe (domestic).

+ Oxford resignations. Smith reported that 4 women cds in Oxford had resigned. Discussion on response: steps to get a team of comrades working directly under Area Committee to get work going; a special area day school with the resigned comrades invited, with the question of the party as first item on the agenda; more active involvement by OC members in Oxford area.

NOTE: This OC was preceded by a discussion with cd Leland of the RWL, mainly on Poland. We discussed our criticisms of the focus of the RWL coverage on Poland (headline 'Defend Solidarnosc! No US intervention'), and the use in their press of 'collectivisation of agriculture' as seemingly an immediate demand: some of us argued that these gave ground, unintentionally, to Stalinist concepts of the 'dangers' of Solidarnosc. Cd Leland argued that there were in fact no substantial differences.

EC.9.4.82

+ Letter from Glasgow WSL objecting to 'one-day strike' call, and to lack of consultation with membership on it. Agreed to publish letter in paper, and to make sure Glasgow WSL is informed about the March 14 extended NC.

+ Letter from Mick J about NUTM work. Agreed Noonan to be responsible from EC for now.

+ Women's comm: steering ctee. Khan proposed a reorganisation. Agreed to leave on table pending clarification of Oxford problems.

OC. 2.4.82

Present: Carolan, Kinnell, Cunliffe, Smith, Jones, Levy.
Absent: Hill.

(Discussion on preparations for April 3 conference and on Tebbit campaign).

OC. 24.3.82

Present: Kinnell, Cunliffe, Smith, Jones, Levy, Hill. Absent: Carolan (ill).

Discussion on April 3 conference, LCDTU, Tebbit campaign.

Women's commission: there was a discussion with Eliot on her resignation from this commission. The OC asked Eliot:

- to reconsider her resignation,
- to reconsider her proposal for an inquiry into the women's commission in the light of the OC's argument that such an inquiry was not appropriate to the problems involved,
- to consider what she would propose the women's commission and the EC do to surmount the women's commission's problems.

OC. 18.3.82

Present: Kinnell, Smith, Jones, Levy, Hill, Carolan. Absent: Cunliffe(holiday).

(Discussion on Tebbit campaign etc.)

OC. 12.3.82

Present: Carolan, Smith, Jones, Levy, Hill, Cunliffe, Kinnell;
plus Khan.

(Discussion on preparations for NC; Tebbit campaign; April 3
conference).

OC. 7.3.82

Present: all members

(Discussion on April 3 conference and Poland demo.)

OC. 25.2.82

(Discussion on current work and on:)

+ Sinclair. After some discussion, Jones proposed an EC investigation into allegations by and against Sinclair. Carolan and Kinnell proposed that the Control Commission should be invoked. Carolan/Kinnell proposal defeated with 2 votes in favour; Jones proposal agreed unanimously. Carolan delegated to carry out EC investigation.

The plenary sessions (in this suggested scheme) would be mainly geared into the discussion streams on the labour movement and on women's liberation.

W.S.L. SUMMER SCHOOL

Proposals from the Executive Committee

- + The summer school is scheduled for July 25 to August 1, in Leicester. Accommodation is booked in a college. This accommodation (including all the meeting halls etc.) will cost approx. £32.90 a head for the week, excluding food.
- + It will be a WSL summer school, not a TILC school, though a number of comrades will be coming from other TILC sections.
- + The central theme of the school will be building the WSL to build the revolutionary party. The two major aspects of this will be sessions directed to clarifying and homogenising the WSL on key issues, and sessions directed towards recruiting into the WSL.
- + This focus is not narrowly exclusive; there will be room for sessions on particular areas of work, etc. But we want to maintain a visible concentration on the central role and tasks of the revolutionary organisation.
- + To encourage maximum participation, a large proportion of the school will be organised in discussion groups rather than plenary sessions. And the plenary sessions will relate back to the discussion groups.
- + The discussion group sessions will be organised in 'streams' on particular topics, i.e. series of 6 or 12 or however many meetings. The 'streams' will be so arranged that no two clash completely in time.
- + Invited speakers and arranged debates will be part of the school.
- + Films, social activities, etc. will be included with a view to making the school enjoyable as well as educational.

The above are main outlines which we suggest the NC should discuss. The detailed working-out of the agenda should, we suggest, be left to the Organising Committee, assisted by proposals in writing from as many comrades as possible.

Below and overleaf is a possible scheme (only an individual suggestion: not necessarily an EC view, still less the final decision).

- Discussion group streams: Three of 12 sessions each -
- Revolutionising the labour movement (would include sessions on youth and on organising left groups in the unions),
 - Women's liberation and socialism
 - What is Trotskyism? (geared to recruitment)
- Six of six sessions each:
- Ireland
 - Poland
 - International solidarity work (other than Irish)
 - The Internationals (again, geared to contacts & new recruits)
 - The work of TILC (introduced by cds from the various sections)
 - Fighting racism/organising in the black communities.
